We have new modern dance from the Asian diaspora, with work from Claudine Naganuma, SanSan Kwan, and Cloud Gate Dance Theatre of Taiwan. And we offer you some hilarious and poignant evenings of spoken word with WNBA Star Brittney Griner, futurist Baratunde Thurston, comic W. Kamau Bell, and the one and only Astria Suparak.

In another Mondavi Center first, thanks to the Manetti Shrem Opera Program at Festival Napa Valley, our fall programming includes a fully staged opera with orchestra. Whether or not you think you're an opera fan, I encourage you to join us for Donizetti's wonderful comedy, *Don Pasquale*. This fresh take on a classic is proof that opera remains relevant, and powerful, and can be a lot of fun.

Land Acknowledgement » We should take a moment to acknowledge the land on which we are gathered. For thousands of years, this land has been the home of Patwin people. Today, there are three federally recognized Patwin tribes: Cachil DeHe Band of Wintun Indians of the Colusa Indian Community, Kletsel Dehe Wintun Nation, and Yocha Dehe Wintun Nation.

The Patwin people have remained committed to the stewardship of this land over many centuries. It has been cherished and protected, as elders have instructed the young through generations. We are honored and grateful to be here today on their traditional lands.

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Synopsis

ACT I

The wealthy and elderly Don Pasquale is at odds with his nephew Ernesto. Don Pasquale had arranged for Ernesto to marry a rich woman and is insulted and enraged to learn that Ernesto is already in love with the poor widow Norina. Don Pasquale decides he must marry to prevent his ungrateful nephew from inheriting his wealth and enlists the clever Dr. Malatesta to help him find a bride. However, Dr. Malatesta is on the side of the young lovers and hatches a plan to see his friends married.

Dr. Malatesta suggests that Don Pasquale marry his (nonexistent) sister, Sofrina, who has been living in a convent. The doctor describes Sofrina as a young, beautiful, and obedient woman who will make an excellent bride and arranges for Don Pasquale to meet her that very evening.

Ernesto enters and once more refuses to marry the woman his uncle has selected for him, confirming once more his love for Norina. Don Pasquale shocks his nephew by announcing his plans to marry and kick Ernesto out of the house! Seeking to change his uncle's mind, Ernesto begs him to consult with Dr. Malatesta before he makes a decision and is devastated to learn that Dr. Malatesta himself suggested the match. Feeling betrayed by his friend and now without the inheritance necessary to marry, Ernesto decides that he needs to leave on a trip abroad to get some distance from his heartbreak.

While reading a silly love story, Norina brags about her ability to charm men, displaying her lighthearted and flirtatious nature. She gets a letter from Ernesto and is distressed to learn that he is leaving. Dr. Malatesta arrives and promises to resolve her problems. The doctor persuades Norina to pretend to be his sister, Sofrina, and trick Pasquale into a sham marriage, thus leaving Pasquale at her mercy. They plot how she will pretend to be docile and shy and hide her flirtatious nature.

ACT II

Ernesto continues to despair over losing Norina while Don Pasquale excitedly prepares to meet his bride. Dr. Malatesta introduces Sofrina/Norina to the Don with her face veiled and she assumes a modest and timid persona, refusing to let him touch her or see her face. At last, she removes the veil and Pasquale agrees to marriage, calling for the notary to marry them at once. Dr. Malatesta has replaced the actual notary with one of his friends to ensure the marriage is false. Before the contract can be signed, Ernesto bursts into the room, intending to say his farewells, and is shocked to see that his uncle is about to marry Norina! Before Ernesto can ruin the plan, Dr. Malatesta convinces Ernesto to go along with the sham marriage and to serve as a witness. The moment that the papers are signed, Norina transforms into a shrew demanding new clothing. carriages, and jewelry all at great expense. Stunned by this sudden transformation, Pasquale is left stammering as the new bride leaves with Ernesto to accompany her on an evening stroll.

ACT III

Don Pasquale laments over the large bills his new wife has accumulated and summons the courage to confront her. Norina is undeterred by his scolding, and instead of joining Don Pasquale in the bedroom, she insists on going out to the theater. Pasquale attempts to forbid her from going and threatens to bar her from the house if she leaves. Norina slaps him, leaving him reeling with regret over his marriage. Norina feels a brief prick of conscience for treating him cruelly but resolves to carry out the plan. As she leaves the room, she drops a note for Pasquale to discover.

Malatesta and Ernesto settle some of the finer details of their plan. As Ernesto leaves, Pasquale confers with Malatesta over the letter Norina has dropped which contains plans for her to meet with her lover. Pasquale intends to expose her faithlessness to the magistrate as revenge. Malatesta, fearing personal repercussions, discourages Pasquale from taking his affairs public and suggests that the two of them catch the couple on their own.

In the garden at night, Ernesto eagerly waits for Norina. Dr. Malatesta and Don Pasquale catch the lovers as planned, but Ernesto flees before his identity can be revealed. Pasquale attempts to use this evidence of her affair to kick her out of the house, but Norina refuses to be shamed. By now desperate to be rid of his nightmare bride, Pasquale asks Dr. Malatesta for help. The doctor suggests that Pasquale allow Ernesto to marry Norina as Sofrina detests Norina and would rather leave the house than share it with another woman. Pasquale readily agrees and calls for Ernesto and Norina at which point all is revealed. The quartet reconciles and Pasquale agrees that it was foolish for him to marry in his old age.

Artists



Vanessa Becerra, Norina

Peruvian & Mexican-American Soprano Vanessa Becerra's 24/25 season is highlighted by her return to LA Opera for *Ainadamar* (Nuria) and her Alice Tully Hall debut with the Chamber Music Society of Lincoln Center. Additional engagements include her house and titular role debut in Paër's *Leonora*

at Chicago Opera Theater, and debuts with Festival Napa Valley in *Don Pasquale* (Norina), Berkshire Opera Festival in *La traviata* (Violetta), and Sacramento Philharmonic & Opera in *Le nozze di Figaro* (Susanna). On the concert stage, Vanessa debuts with Madison Symphony, Indianapolis Symphony, and Illinois Symphony Orchestras as a guest soloist for their respective holiday concerts, and the Boise Philharmonic as the Soprano Soloist in Mozart's *Requiem*.

Last season, Vanessa was a featured soloist at Fort Worth Opera's annual gala and returned to Opera Omaha for *Don Pasquale* (Norina), Minnesota Opera for *L'elisir d'amore* (Adina), Arizona Opera for *Don Giovanni* (Zerlina), and Opera Theatre of Saint Louis for *Galileo Galilei* (Maria Celeste/Eos). On the concert stage she debuted with The Phoenix Symphony for Händel's *Messiah*.

Ms. Becerra is a graduate of the Young Artist Program at the Los Angeles Opera. During her time with LAO, she appeared in *Le nozze di Figaro* (Barbarina), *Die Zauberflöte* (Papagena), *La* *traviata* (Annina), Gossip 2 in the GRAMMY Award-winning recording of Corigliano's *The Ghosts of Versailles*, and as a featured soloist in a concert with bass-baritone Erwin Schrott. Originally from Fort Worth, TX Vanessa is currently based in Chicago.



Matthew Burns, Don Pasquale

Bass-baritone Matthew Burns is celebrated for his musical and comedic capabilities in equal measure. Most recently he appeared as Bartolo in *Le nozze di Figaro* with both Portland Opera and Utah Opera, and returned to The Metropolitan Opera for the reprisal of their production of *The Hours*.

Other recent highlights include Beethoven's *Symphony No. 9* with the Delaware Symphony, Sergeant of Police in *The Pirates of Penzance* with Nashville Opera, and Sulpice in *La fille du régiment* with Utah Opera. In the 2024-2025 season Matt sings the title role in *Don Pasquale* with the Napa Valley Festival and will debut with Opera Colorado as Colline in *La bohème*.

Burns recently made his Seattle Opera debut as Sacristan in *Tosca*. Additional recent highlights include the title role in *Don Pasquale* at Inland Northwest Opera, Don Magnifico in La *Cenerentola* with Annapolis Opera, Suplice in La fille du régiment with Opera Carolina, Dulcamara in L'elisir d'amore with Virginia Opera, Dansker in *Billy Budd* with Central City Opera and joining the Metropolitan Opera for productions of Rigoletto and Die Zauberflöte.

A sought after concert artist, Burns's orchestral engagements include his Carnegie Hall debut singing Händel's *Messiah*; Mozart's *Coronation Mass* with the Atlanta Symphony; and Stravinsky's *Pulcinella* with the Brooklyn Philharmonic. Burns is a two-time recipient of the Richard F. Gold Career Grant for Singers. He is featured on the commercial recordings of Los Angeles Opera's *Die Gezeichneten*, American Symphony Orchestra's *Haggadah shel pessach*, and Florentine Opera's live recording of Carlisle Floyd's *Wuthering Heights*.



Alexey Lavrov, Dottore Malatesta

A graduate of the Metropolitan Opera Lindemann Young Artist Development Program, baritone Alexey Lavrov made his Met company debut in the 2012-2013 season as the Herald in *Otello* and the Flemish Deputy in *Don Carlo* and has since appeared there in numerous celebrated

roles. Recent career highlights have included his debuts at the Opernhaus Zürich, Teatro Real in Madrid, CulturArte de Puerto Rico, Opera Carolina, Cincinnati Opera, Atlanta Opera, Festival Internacional de Ópera Alejandro Granda in Peru, Nemirovich-Danchenko Music Theatre and Mikhailovsky Theatre in Russia, and Kammeroper Schloss Rheinsberg Festival in Germany. Lavrov was also a member of the Young Artist Program at the Bolshoi Theatre where he sang Moralès in *Carmen*, Shchelkalov in *Boris Godunov*, and Robert in *Iolanta*.

A native of the Komi Republic, Russia, Lavrov studied voice at the Republican Art College, Syktyvkar and the St. Petersburg State Conservatory. He was a semi-finalist at the 2014 Operalia International Voice Competition. His many other awards and distinctions include first prize at the 2014 Gerda Lissner Foundation International Vocal Competition and 2010 Hariclea Darclée International Voice Competition, second prize at the 2014 Licia Albanese-Puccini Foundation International Voice Competition and Byulbyul International Vocal Competition, and third prize at the 2014 Loren L. Zachary National Vocal Competition. He has received the 2014 Musique et Vin Festival Prize and 2014 Hildegard Behrens Foundation Award, as well as a diploma from the International Rachmaninoff Competition.



Jonah Hoskins, Ernesto

This season, tenor Jonah Hoskins makes his highly anticipated Bayerische Staatsoper debut as Don Ramiro in Rossini's *La cenerentola*. He returns to Semperoper Dresden as Almaviva in *Il barbiere di Siviglia*, a role he also brings to the Glyndebourne Festival. He sings Ernesto in *Don Pasquale* at

the Mondavi Center under the auspices of Festival Napa Valley, and twice revisits the role of Nemorino in *L'elisir d'amore*, with Florida Grand Opera and Manitoba Opera. On the concert stage, Hoskins is heard as tenor soloist in Mozart's *Requiem* alongside soprano Hanna-Elisabeth Müller and the Camerata Salzburg, led by Dame Jane Glover. He also joins the annual New Year Concert of the Sächsische Staatskapelle Dresden with soprano Fatma Said and under the baton of Karina Canellakis. The concert will be broadcast on national television.

Last season as an ensemble member at Theater St Gallen in Switzerland, Jonah Hoskins debuted the role of Arnold in a new production of Rossini's *Guillaume Tell*. With Opéra National de Bordeaux and Théâtre des Champs-Elysées in Paris, he saw his first performances of Nadir in *Les pêcheurs de perles*. He made his house debut with the San Francisco Opera in the role of Nemorino in *L'elisir d'amore*, a role he reprised in the summer for the Santa Fe Opera. On the concert stage, Hoskins presented a solo recital in collaboration with pianist William Woodard for DC Vocal Arts at the Kennedy Center and sang as the tenor soloist in Carl Orff's *Carmina Burana* at Theater St. Gallen.



Slater Penney, Actor

Slater Penney has an Emmy award from Tech TV and an MFA from UC Davis. This is Penney's fourth production with the Manetti Shrem Opera, and they're happy to be revisiting the multiple silent roles in Don Pasquale. Slater studied dance, circus, clown and mime skills at UC Santa Cruz, The San

Francisco Circus Center, The Dell'Arte International School of Physical Theatre, and UC Davis. They've performed professionally since 1994, appeared on TEDx, and brought their original piece, The Submarine Show, to the Edinburgh Fringe and around the world. He currently works as a GM for several paid Dungeons and Dragons groups through bayarearpg.com, and teaches Parkour Playground classes at Athletic Playground.



Noah Lindquist, Music Director

Rising conductor Noah Lindquist made his debut in summer 2023 with Festival Napa Valley's Don Pasquale featuring Lucas Meachem in the title role. Lindquist brings to the podium a wealth of experience, having coached leading singers of the Metropolitan Opera, San Francisco Opera, and the Lyric Opera of Chicago, where he has worked on more than 60 productions. As a performer, Lindquist has collaborated with many of the great opera singers of our time, including Lucas Meachem, Matthew Polenzani, Quinn Kelsey, Michael Fabiano, Ana Maria Martinez, and Pene Pati.

Originally a native of Brooklyn, NY, Noah resides in Chicago, where he is Assistant Conductor at the Lyric Opera of Chicago. Noah brings to his work a deep love of great singing and a profound sense of responsibility to the extraordinary singers he has the privilege of working with.



Jean-Romain Vesperini, Stage Director

Jean-Romain Vesperini is a widely acclaimed artistic director and producer of operatic performances on stages from La Scala to the Bolshoi, Paris to Monte Carlo. A trained baritone, he is deeply connected to music,

with a unique awareness of what a score brings to dramaturgy.

Jean-Romain Vesperini studied acting at l'École du Théâtre National de Chaillot in Paris and singing at the Guildhall School of Music and Drama in London, where he trained as a baritone. After graduation, he decided to pursue a career as a stage director and spent several years collaborating with Luc Bondy, Peter Stein, and Georges Lavaudant.

Vesperini made his US debut staging Puccini's *Gianni Schicchi* at Festival Napa Valley. Following the production, he was invited then invited by the festival to stage *Elisir d'Amore* in 2022 and *Don Pasquale* in 2023, Mozart's *The Abduction from the Seraglio* in 2024. He also started working regularly with Summerscape Festival at Fisher Center at Bard, where he stage Saint Saens Henry VIII, which was acclaimed by The New York Times, as one of the ten best Classical music performances in 2023.



Anouar Brissel, Video Design

Anouar Brissel is a self-taught video artist whose work brings live performance art. His video-scenography for operas includes *Gianni Schicchi, L'Elisir d'Amore,* and *Don Pasquale* directed by Jean-Romain Vesperini at Festival Napa Valley's Manetti Shrem

Opera in California. His design also vividly brings characters' fantasies to life in *Une autre histoire de Manon*, directed by Claire Manjarrès performed in St-Étienne, Vichy, Massy. Collaborations with director James Bonas have resulted in productions like *Ariadne auf Naxos* at Magdeburg Opera house, and more.

In dance, Brissel's video creations have been featured in Ravel's Boléro at the Grand Théâtre de Genève, Emma Bovary at the Toronto Ballet, and A Kiss to the World at the Düsseldorf Opera. His work was highlighted at the Royal Albert Hall for the BBC Proms 2023 and at the Helsinki Music Center with the famous Aurora orchestra performing the Rite of Spring.

Brissel's upcoming projects include *Lady Macbeth* with the Dutch National Ballet, *Mary Queen of Scots* with the Scottish Ballet, Company at Theatre du Chatelet, *The Sorcerer* at the Presidio Center for the Arts Theater, and *The Magic Flute* at the Göteborg Opera.



Matthew Antaky, Lighting and Scenic Design

While studying the fine arts, Matthew Antaky turned his interests to the performing arts. His 30 years history includes extensive designs and collaborations in the world of opera, dance, music and theater. His work has

been seen throughout the United States and in many countries around the world.

Mr. Antaky is an eight-time nominee and four-time recipient of the Isadora Duncan Award for outstanding visual design.



Callie Floor, Costume Designer

Callie Floor, one of the leading costume designers in the bay area has worked with companies such as: American Conservatory Theater, California Revels, Aurora Theatre, Berkeley Repertory Theatre, Marin Theatre Co., Cal Shakes, Word for Word, West Bay

Opera, Rork Music.

With Festival Napa Valley, she has designed costumes for various projects including: *Gianni Schicchi, L'elisir d'amore* and *Abduction from the Seraglio*. Recent projects include Ruddygore for Lamplighters Music Theater and Twelfth Night for SPARC. She has a BFA from the University of Utah and a Higher Diploma in Theater Design from the Slade School of Fine Art, University College London.



Susan Stone, Wig, Hair and Make-up Designer

Susan Stone has been involved with makeup, hair dressing and wig making for over 40 years. Primarily in the opera world, Stone trained to be an opera singer and "that is the world I like to inhabit."

Stone has worked for many opera companies throughout the United States including: San Francisco Opera, Houston Grand Opera, Florida Grand, Seattle Opera, Portland Opera, Atlanta, Fort Worth and others. She has worked most recently three years with the Manetti Shrem Opera Program of Festival Napa Valley, Lamplighters and Berkeley Repertory Theater.



Tanya Kane-Parry, Assistant Director and Supertitle Design

Tanya Kane-Parry is a director/choreographer in theatre, opera, dance. Credits include productions at Long Beach Opera, LA Phil, Festival Opera, Opera Omaha, Houston Grand Opera, Washington National Opera,

Los Angeles Opera, Canadian Opera Company, Liceo Opera (Barcelona), National Opera of Bordeaux, Angels Vocal Arts and recently she was the assistant director for the production of *The Abduction from the Seraglio* at Napa Valley Festival. She is also a professor in the Department of Theatre and Dance at Cal State LA.



Bethanie Baeyen, Stage Manager and Technical Director

Bethanie Baeyen has been the production manager for MSOP since its inaugural season in 2021 where she assembled a team of production designers and crew. She has piloted into existence more than 100 shows

as a Stage Manager for plays and an Assistant Director for operas. Companies she has worked for include: Pacific Repertory Theatre, Philip Glass' Days & Nights Festival Carmel, California Revels Inc., Bravo: Vail!, California Shakespeare Theater, San Francisco Opera's Merola Program, Marin Theater Co., Shotgun Players, PlayGround, Opera San Jose, Livermore Valley Opera, Sacramento Opera, Encore Theatre Co., Music Circus, Opera Boston, and le Theâtre Mouffetard in Paris, France. Directing credits include: *Noises Off!, The Pied Piper* and *Amahl and the Night Visitors*. She studied at the Dell 'Arte School of Physical Comedy, The San Francisco Mime Troupe, the Université de Paris Sorbonne Nouvelle and CSU Sacramento where she earned a BA in Theatre Arts.



Zach Salsburg-Frank, Asst. Producer and Asst. Conductor

Emerging conductor Zach Salsburg-Frank brings vibrant and dynamic performances of opera, orchestral, and choral repertoire to a new generation of music lovers with his unique blend of vocal and orchestral expertise.

Originally from Oakland, California, Zach found his passion for conducting and singing when he joined the GRAMMY Awardwinning Pacific Boychoir at age 9. He has been named the Interim Music Director of the Pacific Boychoir Academy for the 2024-25 season. Zach's 2024-25 season includes conducting Chandler Opera Company's *Carmen* and assistant conducting Festival Napa Valley's production of *Don Pasquale*.

Zach made his opera debut in Opera McGill's 2019 production of *Die Zauberflöte*, singing in the chorus. While completing his undergraduate degree, Zach made his opera conducting debut in Opera McGill's production of Verdi's *Un Giorno di Regno*.

Zach's summer season included joining Opera Saratoga as a Festival Artist to assistant conduct *Così fan tutte* and conducting opera scenes with Festival Orchestra Napa at Festival Napa Valley.

Past engagements include conducting Chandler Opera's *Il Barbiere di Siviglia* and *La traviata*, Festival Napa Valley's opera scenes program with orchestra, assistant conducting Sacramento Philharmonic & Opera's *La bohème* and Opéra de Toulon's *Don Giovanni*, serving as an apprentice conductor on Seattle Opera's production of *Tristan und Isolde*, the Canadian Opera Company's *La bohème*, and Arizona Opera's *Die Zauberflöte* and *Don Giovanni*.

Zach received a Master of Music in Conducting, with an emphasis in opera, from Arizona State University a Bachelor of Music in Voice and Conducting from McGill University.



Marika Yasuda, Rehearsal Pianist and Music Preparation

Japanese-American pianist and vocal coach Marika Yasuda is a recent graduate of the Adler Fellowship Program at San Francisco Opera, and is a doctoral candidate in Collaborative Piano at Indiana University. She

is a regular member of music staff at San Francisco Opera where she has worked on productions of *L'Elisir d'Amore, El último sueño de Frida y Diego* by Gabriela Frank, *La Traviata*, and *Dream of the Red Chamber* by Bright Sheng. This season, she returns to SFO on Poul Ruders' *The Handmaid's Tale* and is also on music staff at Palm Beach Opera, New Orleans Opera, and Opera Theatre of Saint Louis.

Ms. Yasuda has performed recitals and orchestral concerts at Carnegie Hall, the Kennedy Center, Seiji Ozawa Hall, Green Music Center, Bennett Gordon Hall, and Taube Atrium Theater among others. She currently holds a position as vocal coach on the collegiate faculty at San Francisco Conservatory of Music, and regularly engages in performances throughout the Bay area. She previously worked as a coach accompanist for Indiana University Opera Theater and has held fellowships at festivals such as the Merola Opera Program, Ravinia's Steans Music Institute, Tanglewood Music Center, SongFest at Colburn, and the Banff Centre for Arts and Creativity.
